# Board of Trustees' Meeting March 4, 2019 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### **Community Engagement**

The Percussion Studio at the University of Tennessee at Martin performed "Roots of Rhythm," musical selections within a global cultural exchange. The performance explained the roots/origins of African musical percussion instruments and the geographical significance of African music on world music.

During Black History Month the president was invited along with a federal judge and Marion mayoral candidate to participate on a panel discussion relative to racial healing, dialogue and call to action at the African American Museum in Carbondale.

#### **Academics**

This month Dr. Shelby and the president met with Superintendent Jason Hayes of Metropolis to identify ways to partner and increase dual enrollment and general usage of the Metropolis Center. Dr. Shelby is coordinating these events with the site director.

Dean Mason, coordinator Tony LaForest, and the president met with ROTC leadership at Southern Illinois University - Carbondale (SIU) to discuss partnership opportunities through the university. The ROTC collegiate program allows students through an SIU agreement to take classes toward degree requirements. If the agreement is approved, Shawnee Community College will be the second community college to have an opportunity for an ROTC partnership. This partnership allows students to take university classes, obtain cadet status their second year, and receive a monthly stipend of \$400.00 to assist them while in college. Their tuition and fees are covered by ROTC as well.

The president, Dr. Shelby (who is coordinating dual credit enrollment), Superintendent Josh Stafford and area high school representatives met with SIU-Carbondale College of Education to develop a plan to address the teacher shortage in Southern Illinois. Our conversations centered around the "Grow Your Own" model and the opportunity to apply for a planning grant to scale Education Pathways in Illinois. Two thousand teaching, administrative, support staff, and other

positions were not filled in 2017. The most critical issue is "the demographic gap between Illinois students and educators"... over half (51.5 %) of the state's 2 million public school students were racially and ethnically diverse while 16.7 % of Illinois teachers were similarly diverse." (Illinois School Report Card 2017).

The president and area presidents met with the chancellors and president of SIU-Carbondale to discuss various ways to partner, serve the southern Illinois region and network as a group to ensure the educational and training needs of our region are satisfied. All area community colleges were in attendance and shared their unique problems, perspectives, and suggestions.

#### <u>Professional Development</u>

On February 7<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup>, the HLC External Evaluator/Coach facilitated two meetings to address the two areas of concerns from the accreditation site visit in Fall 2018. As part of the action plan, committees were established. Opportunities to prepare for the HLC focus visit were extended to faculty, staff, and administration to solicit participation and suggestions. The Policy & Procedures Committee, Assessment, and other existing committees are continuing. Meetings with faculty and administration have been scheduled.

#### **Students**

#### 60X2025 Grant

The annual meeting in Collinsville focused on the Completion Agenda and College Career Pathway endorsements. The Shawnee College partnership with Vienna High School for dual credit enrollment was highlighted.

#### **Enrollment**

According to Dr. Brian Durham, Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) Executive Director, Illinois enrollment has declined by nearly 100,000 students from 2008 to Fall 2018. About 75,000 were community college students. Some colleges have gained students such as the University of

Illinois with 23% growth and McHenry County College with a 31% increase. (ICCTA Report, 2018)

#### **Foundation**

The Foundation met and is continuing to plan for the May 4<sup>th</sup> Scholarship Gala event at 5:30 PM. ### Academic Affairs & Student Learning Report Board of Trustees Report March 4, 2019

The Academic Affairs office is in the planning stages of creating the summer and fall schedule. The process is complete for two new credentials, the Gerontology Aide Certificate which will allow students to qualify for financial aid, and the General Education Core Curriculum Credential, which should ease transfer of courses from one Illinois higher education institution to another.

#### Instructional Technology Department

Russ and the IT department were able to make the Vienna ITV room fully operational. A special thanks to Teale Betts and those at Vienna High School that helped. One ITV room is at Vienna with plans for a second one. Russ continues to look at Zoom as an instructional tool. This semester two courses are being taught over Zoom. Russ and Chris went to SIU to see how they are using Zoom to replace the traditional video conferencing systems.

#### **Teaching and Learning Center**

Rob Lucas has held several workshops in the TLC, Preparing your Moodle Course Shell for Instruction, Active Learning Using Free Polling Software (NISOD), Managing Moodle Quizzes, and Using ReadSpeaker. Rob created and hosted, "Guesstimate" for the WYSE student competition. He also presented "Educational Gaming" at the Science Center in the South Conference at SIU. Rob and the Teaching and Learning Center hosted the Growing Online Learning Web Conference (ILCCO) in February. The TLC offered assistance to many students and faculty. Faculty (full time and adjunct) have come to the TLC for assistance 53 times.

#### Library

From the beginning of the semester through mid-February, Tracey Johnson, librarian, has presented eight classroom programs about library research, reaching 148 students. Classes included developmental English, English composition, music, and ADN nursing. Tracey, also, presented to cosmetology students how using historical research can help to portray a real person, including primary sources and period appropriate clothing.

Library reserves, in which faculty members can place items to be viewed in-house or checked out to students, handled 64 transactions in January. In regular circulation, the library checked out 214 items, including renewals. Library staff helped 240 people, 288 times (headcounts unduplicated by day, duplicated by month). Of those 240 people, 23 were new patron registrations, and 11 were faculty members who were helped for approximately 105 minutes. The library had 101 people at tables in the library and 24 people used study rooms.

#### **Anna Center**

During the month of February, the Anna Extension Center has hosted several community events. On February 5<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>, the Southern Seven Head Start program held training meetings in the conference room. On February 7<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>, CPR courses were taught in the conference room. A Driver Safety course was held at the Anna Extension Center on Saturday, February 9<sup>th</sup>. The Union County CEO program held their monthly board meeting in the conference room on February 19<sup>th</sup>. On February 13<sup>th</sup>, a transfer representative from SEMO visited the Anna Center and met with potential students. The Illinois Department of Agriculture hosted a pesticide testing event at the Anna Center on February 25<sup>th</sup>. The Anna Center offered a combination seven latestart day and evening classes that began on February 4<sup>th</sup>. On February 1<sup>st</sup>, an Anna Extension Center staff member along with the Shawnee Community College Ambassadors, showed their support at an Anna-Jonesboro Wildcats boys basketball game and threw out SCC shirts and towels and were on hand to answer questions about the college.

#### Cairo Center

The Cairo Center has seen an increase in foot-traffic in the evenings. Classrooms 103 and 104 are now being used due to expanded course offerings. The Cairo Interim Director has reached out to a high school counselor in Charleston, MO, and has sent information to be distributed to potential students.

#### Metro Center

Shawnee Community College and the Metro Center were represented at the Massac County High School boys' basketball game on Friday, February 1<sup>st</sup>. On February 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>, US Army Sergeant Shuhart, will offer career opportunities within the United States Army. On February 1<sup>st</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) training for the City of Metropolis will be held at the Metro Center.

#### Vienna Center

The Vienna Extension Center held its inaugural class on Monday, February 4, 2019. The class is (Speech) SPC 111 with 11 students and taught by Jeff McGoy. The Vienna Extension Center will offer (Philosophy) PHI 215, which will start on March 18th and be offered via ITV. Vienna High School students will be registering for summer and fall classes at the Center when registration for the summer and fall opens. Excitement is building for future course offerings at Vienna. Community members have stopped by and/or called the center to ask questions about future offerings.

#### **Student Success Center**

<u>Tutoring</u>: Thirty-three requests for tutoring were submitted.

<u>Testing Lab</u>: There were 219 exams administered 74 ACCUPLACER, 1 CNA State Certification exam, 8 testing with accommodations, 3 Distance Learning exams, 45 make-up exams, 43 LPN entrance exams, 24 ADN entrance exams, 1 College Level Examination Program (CLEP), 6 Health Occupation Aptitude Exams (HOAE) and 14 Pearson Vue exams).

Retention Alert: There are currently 105 student retention cases open -52 academic issues, 51 classroom issues, and 2 personal issues. Faculty and advisors work in collaboration to bridge students to resources; both internal and external to promote student success. Case categories range from attendance, classroom, financial and personal issues.

#### Financial Aid

The Financial Aid Office disbursed \$110,475.40 in MAP grants to 176 students (as of 2/15/2019) for Fall 2018. The office has begun processing scholarship applications for FY 2019-2010. Pell Status Day is February 25, 2019.

#### **Professional Development**

Many members of the division will be participating in a free webinar focused on supporting students with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) on February 22, 2019. Research shows that the number of students diagnosed with ASD continues to rise. This presentation is designed to help staff recognize the characteristics of ASD, discuss what a student with ASD might need in a college setting and explore strategies to help students be successful. The webinar is sponsored by the Illinois Community College Board.

The Maintenance department purchased the new 37-passenger bus with an expected delivery by the end of the month. Maintenance also completed a punch list of remaining items at the Cairo Extension Center and revamped the Veterans' Outreach Center as part of the Illinois Department of Veterans Affair's - Veterans' Cash Grant program.

The Bookstore participated in the College's Spirit Week by hosting sales on merchandise and sponsoring giveaways that included a tablet PC and SCC gear.

# Black History Month



# Harner waives preliminary hearing

Former Johnson County Sheriff's Deputy Cyle Harner waived his preliminary hearing Friday afternoon at the Johnson County Courthouse in Vienna on three counts in connection with a fatal crash in March 2018 that killed 24-year-old Troy Newman and severely injured both Harner and Tyler Inman.

With the waiving of the preliminary hearing, Har-

ner will be arraigned on the charges on March 22.

Harner is facing a reckless homicide charge, a Class 3 Felony, in relation to Newman's death.

Harner is also charged with two counts of aggravated driving under the influence, one in relation to Newman's death (a Class 2 Felony) and the other related to Inman's injuries (a Class 4 Felony).

Harner could be looking at 3-14 years in prison on

the Class 2 Felony charge, while a Glass 3 Felony carries a potential prison sentence of 2-5 years and a Class 4 Felony carries a sentence of 1-12 years.

However, each charge also carries the possibility of probation — 2 1/2 years each on the Class 3 and 4 felonies, and four years on the Class 2 Felony. All three counts also are each punishable with a fine of up to \$25,000.

Those three charges

stem from a fatal crash on March 22, 2018. According to the charges, Hamer allegedly was driving a Ford F-350 truck on Old Route 146 Loop, just west of Honeysuckle Lane, at a speed of 93 miles per hour when he failed to safely negotiate a curve.

The truck then left the roadway, became airborne and struck one or more trees, resulting in Newman's death and Inman receiving serious injuries.
